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Pastors Support

When you approach your pastor about ministry to men, there are a few key points to keep in mind:

- Your pastor's schedule. Be respectful of his time, and be willing to meet him on his terms. You don't want to just catch him after Mass, try to get some scheduled time with him.
- Come prepared. Know exactly what you want to communicate and exactly what your ask is. A well-organized presentation inspires confidence.
- Ask how engaged men could help his vision for the parish. Ideally, ministry to men isn't one more thing on his plate, the discipleship that your ministry fosters becomes an engine supporting your pastor and making meaningful progress in accomplishing his vision.
- When you invite your pastor's involvement, give your pastor space to define what involvement looks like. If you come with too many requests, he may shut down. The most important thing you can ask for is his prayers and for his spiritual fatherhood over the group.

Capture Momentum With The Right Next Step

Key principles raised in this session were:

1. Always have a right next step
2. Before men leave an event they should be committed to the next step
3. Be realistic with expectations
4. Respect each man's pace, discipleship is a long-term low-pressure process

RIGHT NEXT STEPS

Sustain Momentum Through Relationships

Key principles raised in this session were:

1. True change requires long term commitment
2. Maintain variety
3. Know and use your resources
4. Invest in men who will invest in other men
5. Pray to be a part of God's plan, not that he would be a part of yours

Sustaining ministry is all about long-term relationships. What are some formats that you think would work well in your parish to keep men in communion while moving towards Christ? Examples: weekly breakfast (or earlier) meetings, large groups, small groups, virtual meetings or prayer, sacramental meetings (e.g. Adoration) etc.

Just as with content, having variety in format will help reach a broader section of men in your parish. That doesn't make morning meetings bad, but be on the lookout for who the formats will be more or less effective in reaching.
